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# War and Capitalism

- War as an endless cycle driven by profit.
- Mother Courage survives by trading but loses her children one by one.
- War is shown as an industry that thrives on human suffering.
- Quote: 'War is like love, it always finds a way'.

# Survival vs. Morality

- Mother Courage prioritizes business over moral choices.
- Struggle to survive often demands compromise.
- She represents the cost of survival in wartime.
- Theme Question: Can survival justify exploitation?

# The Cost of War on Family

- Each child (Eilif, Swiss Cheese, Kattrin) dies due to the war.
- War destroys personal bonds, even the most sacred: family.
- The irony: her nickname 'Mother Courage' contrasts with her tragic losses.

# Silence and Voice (Kattrin's Sacrifice)

- Kattrin is mute but becomes the moral voice of the play.
- Her drumming saves children, showing true courage.
- Brecht contrasts greed-driven 'courage' with selfless sacrifice.

# Religion and Fate

- Characters invoke God but rely on war profits.
- Brecht critiques blind faith in divine protection.
- Suggests human responsibility, not fate, drives tragedy.

# Alienation Effect and Themes

- Songs, placards, and irony prevent emotional immersion.
- Audience forced to analyze, not sympathize.
- Themes: war, capitalism, morality → meant to provoke thought, not pity.

# Conclusion

- War dehumanizes and commodifies life.
- ‘Mother Courage’ embodies the paradox of resilience and destruction.
- Brecht urges: Don’t admire her — learn from her mistakes.
