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Past Simple Tense

1. Definition and Usage

Usage:

- 1. Completed actions in the past:
- Example: "She visited Paris last year."
- 2. A series of completed actions:
- Example: "He entered the room, turned on the light, and sat down."
- 3. **Duration in the past (with start and end points):**
- Example: "They lived in Japan for five years."
- 4. Past habits or routines:
- Example: "When I was a child, I walked to school every day."

2. Forming the Past Simple Tense

The Past Simple Tense can be formed in two ways: using regular verbs and irregular verbs. **Regular Verbs:**

For regular verbs, the Past Simple is formed by adding -ed to the base form of the



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verb.

Structure:

 $\{Base form\} + \{-ed\}$

Examples:

- walk \rightarrow walked
- play \rightarrow played
- visit \rightarrow visited

Irregular Verbs:

Irregular verbs do not follow a specific pattern, so their past forms must be

memorized.

Examples:

- go \rightarrow went
- have \rightarrow had
- see → saw

3. Affirmative, Negative, and Interrogative Forms

Affirmative Form:

{Subject} + {past form of the verb}

- She walked to the store.
- They saw a movie.

Negative Form:

In the negative form, use did not (didn't) followed by the base form of the verb.{Subject} + {did not (didn't)} + {base form of the verb}

- She did not (didn't) walk to the store.



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- They did not (didn't) see a movie.

Interrogative Form:

In the interrogative form, use did before the subject, followed by the base form of the verb.

{Did} + {subject} + {base form of the verb}?

- Did she walk to the store?
- Did they see a movie?

4. Time Expressions Commonly Used with the Past Simple

Certain time expressions are often used with the Past Simple Tense to indicate when an action took place:

- yesterday
- last week/month/year
- in 2005 (any specific year)
- an hour ago (any time period ago)
- when I was a child (specific past time)

Examples:

- I finished my homework yesterday.
- They moved to a new house last month.
- We met in 2018.
- 5. Common Mistakes and Tips1. Using the base form instead of the past form for regular verbs:
- Incorrect: "She walk to the store."
- Correct: "She walked to the store."
- 2. Confusing irregular verbs:



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-	Incorrect:	"He	goed	to	the	park.	"
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- Correct: "He went to the park."
- 3. Using did not with the past form of the verb:
- Incorrect: "She didn't walked to the store."
- Correct: "She didn't walk to the store."
- 4. Remember that the verb "to be" has unique past forms:
- I/he/she/it was
- You/we/they were
- Example: "I was happy." / "They were excited."
