That is, between the principles of reason And religious teachings
- Expressing an essentially philosophical and theological position, whether among Western Christians or among Arab Muslims or Jews.
- 3. Reconciliation between religion and philosophy, or between reason and revelation, as it is a reconciliatory philosophy in its essence that tries hard to reconcile philosophy with the teachings of Christianity in favor of faith. Although the faith-based nature prevails over it, it has taken religious authority as a criterion for truth, and given the truths of religion absolute priority, making philosophy the servant of religion.
