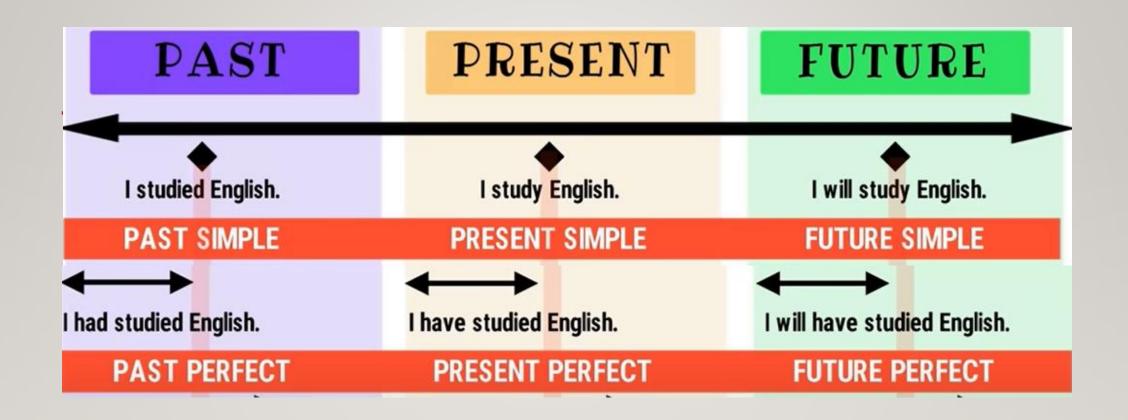

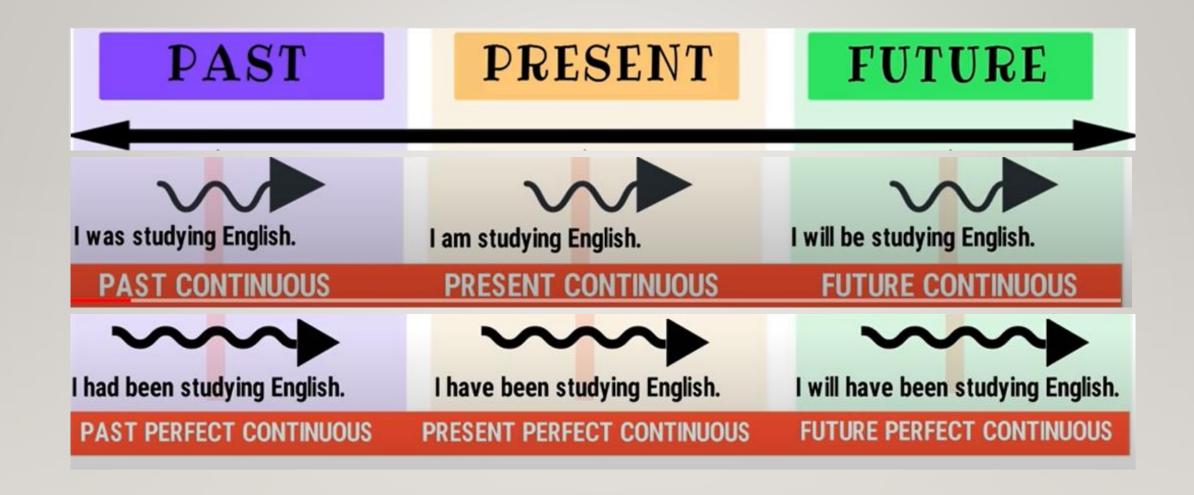

## **VERBTENSES**

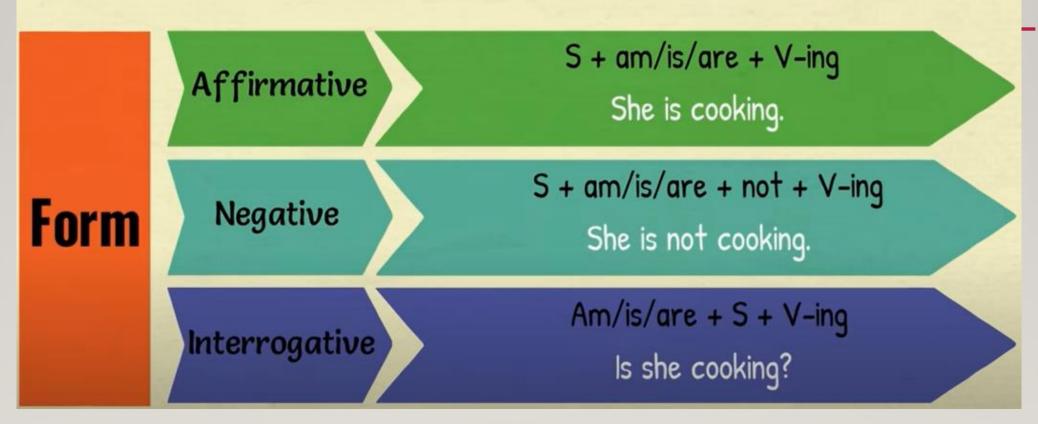




#### PRESENT SIMPLE TENSE **Verbs** To Be S + am/is/are S + verb **Affirmative** I like tea. He is a doctor. S + don't/doesn't + verb S + am/is/are + not Negative Form I don't like tea. He is not a doctor. Am/is/are + S Do/does + S + verb Interrogative Is he a doctor? Do you like tea?

Usage	Example
General truth	The sun rises in the east.
Habits	I play badminton every Tuesday.
Future Timetables.	Our train leaves at 9 am.
Future after "When", "until".	I won't go out until it stops rainning.
Permanent situations	He works in a bank.
For newspaper headlines	Man enters space.
With non-progressive	I believe that you are innocent.
When telling stories.	Suddenly, the window opens and a masked man enters.
For giving directions and instructions.	First of all, you break the eggs and whisk with sugar.

#### PRESENT CONTINUOUS TENSE



Usage	Ex ample	Time Expressions
Action happening now	Jim is watching television at the moment.	Now, at the moment, currently .
Temporary situations	I am staying with a friend for a few days.	At the moment, these days, for a few days
Annoying habits	That child is always crying for no good reason.	Always, forever, constantly
Changing situations	Her health is improving by leaps and bounds.	Little by little, gradually
Definite future plans	I am taking my French class on Tuesday.	Tonight, later, this weekend

### PRESENT PERFECT TENSE



**Affirmative** 

S + have/has + past participle
I have tried sushi before.

Negative

S + have/has + not + past participle
I have not tried sushi before.

Interrogative

Have/has + S + past participle Have you tried sushi before?

Usage	Example	Adverb
Things you have done in your life.	I have been to England.	just
Number of times you have done something.	I have been to Paris three times.	already
Recently completed actions which are important now.	I have already lost my job.	Yet For
Situations that started in the past and are still true.	I have known James for four or five years.	Since
Present result.	John has just missed the bus, so he will be late.	Never

### PRESENT PERFECT CONTINUOUS TENSE



**Affirmative** 

S + have/has + been + present participle

They have been learning English for two years.

Negative

S + have/has + not + been + present participle

They have not been learning English for years.

Interrogative

Have/has + S + been + present participle

Have they been learning English for years?

### PRESENT PERFECT CONTINUOUS TENSE

Usage

Long actions that started in the past and continue until now.

I have been living in Ireland for almost 4 years.

Recent actions that have clear evidence or results now. Her eyes are red because she has been crying all evening.

Typically used for shorter, more temporary situations.

Have they been learning English this week?

#### **PAST SIMPLE TENSE Verbs** To Be S + Was/were S + V2 **Affirmative** I bought two tickets yesterday. He was there. S + did not + V S + Was/were + not Negative **Form** I did not buy any ticket yesterday. He was not there. Was/were + S Did + S + V Interrogative Was he there? Did you buy any ticket yesterday?

Completed action in the past.	I saw a ghost last Friday.	Yesterday

### PAST CONTINUOUS TENSE



**Affirmative** 

S + was/were + V-ing
She was cooking all morning.

Negative

S + was/were + not + V-ing

She was not sleeping when he came home.

Interrogative

Was/were + S + V-ing
Was she sleeping when he came home?

Usage	Ex ample Ex ample	Time Expressions
Interrupted action in the past.	They were waiting for the train when I spoke to them.	When
Parallel actions	I was studying when my mother was watching TV.	While
Story background	While I was driving to work yesterday	Constantly
Past habit	I was always cooking when I got home from school.	At that time
Specific time as an interruption.	Last night at 6 p.m, I was eating dinner.	In those days
Emphasis of length of action	I was working in the garden all day.	All morning
Arrangement in the past.	I was upset because I was leaving there that morning.	For hours
A series of parallel actions	When I came to school, the school bell was ringing, many students were running towards the garden, teachers were going out from classrooms.	Always

#### PAST PERFECT TENSE



**Affirmative** 

S + had + past participle

He had finished the test when the bell rang.

Negative

S + had + not + past participle

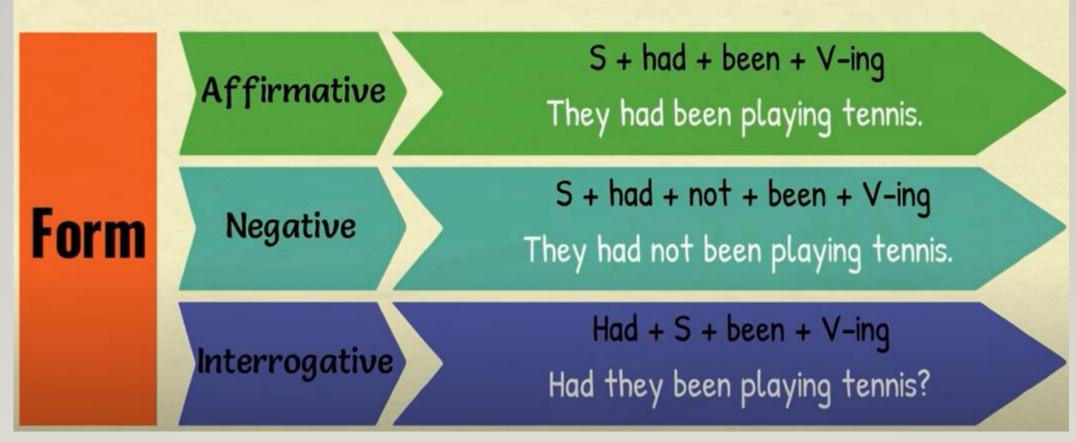
He had not finished the test when the bell rang.

Interrogative

Had + S + past participle
Had he finished the test when the bell rang?

Usage	Example	Time Expressions
Action finished before another past action.	John had gone out when his wife arrived in the office.	Already

Action happened before a specific time in the past.	Julia had never been to an opera before last night.	For

Action started in the past and continued up to a given time in the past.	We had owned that car for ten years before it broke down.	Just

### PAST PERFECT CONTINUOUS TENSE





Express a past action that already started and continued up to another action or time in the past.

The boys had been playing soccer for about an hour when it started to rain.

Emphasize the duration of an activity in the past.

Richard needed a holiday because he had been working hard for six months.

Express the cause of something in the past.

He was tired because he had been jogging.

#### **FUTURE SIMPLE TENSE** S + will/shall + V **Affirmative** I will go to Thailand. S + will/shall + not + V **Form** Negative I will not go to Thailand. Will/shall + S + V Interrogative Will you go to Thailand?

Usage	Ex ample	Time Expressions	
For actions decided at the moment of speech.	I have a toothache. I will take medicine.	Tomorrow	
For unplanned future actions.	Winter will come soon.	Soon Later	
With conditional, time and purpose clauses.	When I arrive at home, I will call you.	Next week In two weeks/month	
For unpreventable actions in future.	Summer will come soon.	Next year	
For offering, ordering, threatening.	I am afraid we will get wet.	Later	
For thoughts, predictions, assumptions, sureness, fears about future.	I promise I will not tell anyone your secret.	The day after tomorrow.	

### **FUTURE CONTINUOUS TENSE**



Usage	Example	Time Expressions
Interrupted actions in the future.	When you come tomorrow, they will be playing tennis.	Next week
Actions in progress at a specific time in the future.	At 12 o'clock tomorrow, we will be having lunch at school.	At 5 p.m tomorrow  Next time
Parallel actions or series of parallel actions in the future.	He will be watching TV, and she will be cooking dinner.	Next week
To ask a question politely about the future.	Will you be bringing your friend to the party tonight?	In the future
Emphasis on future plans and intentions.	He will be coming to visit us next week.	At this time next Friday
Atmosphere in the future.	When I arrive at the party, everybody will be celebrating, some will be dancing, others will be talking.	Next year  At this time tomorrow
Refer to actions that are happening now and expected to continue some time in the future	Unfortunately, sea levels will still be rising in 20 years	

#### **VERB TENSES**

The past tense describes actions that have already happened or a state in the past.

The present tense describes actions that are happening now or habitually performed.

The future tense describes actions that have yet to happen or a state that does not yet exist.

I wrote a story.
He wrote a story.
You did not write a story.
Did she write a story?

I write a story. He writes a story. You do not write a story. Does she write a story? I shall write a story. He will write a story. You will not write a story. Will she write a story?

CONTINUOUS

I was writing a story.
He was writing a story.
You were not writing a story.
Was she writing a story?

I am writing a story. He is writing a story. You are not writing a story. Is she writing a story? I shall be writing a story.

He will be writing a story.

You will not be writing a story.

Will she be writing a story?

PERFECT

I had written a story.

He had written a story.

You had not written a story.

Had she written a story?

I have written a story. He has written a story. You have not written a story. Has she written a story? I shall have written a story. He will have written write a story. You will not have written a story. Will she have written a story?

PERFECT CONTINUOUS I had been writing a story. He had been writing a story. You had not been writing a story. Had she been writing a story? I have been writing a story. He has been writing a story. You have not been writing a story. Has she been writing a story?

I shall have been writing a story. He will have been writing a story. You will not have been writing a story. Will she have been writing a story?
