

5. Future Continuous

Structure:

Subject + will be + verb(-ing)

Examples:

- *This time tomorrow, I'll be flying to New York.*
- *Will you be using the car later?*

Use:

- Action that will be in progress at a specific future time.

6. Future Perfect

Structure:

Subject + will have + past participle

Examples:

- *By next week, she will have finished the project.*
- *They will not have arrived by noon.*

Use:

- Action that will be completed before a certain point in the future.

7. Future Perfect Continuous

Structure:

Subject + will have been + verb(-ing)

Examples:

- *By 5 p.m., I will have been studying for six hours.*
- *They'll have been working together for ten years by 2025.*

Use:

- Focuses on the **duration** of an activity **up to a future time**.

Time Expressions

- **Will:** tomorrow, next week, later, soon, in a minute
- **Going to:** tomorrow, later, soon
- **Present Continuous:** tonight, tomorrow, on Monday
- **Simple Present:** at 9:00, next Friday (schedules)
- **Perfect Tenses:** by 2025, before noon, for 2 hours, since morning
