5. Future Continuous

Structure:

Subject + will be + verb(-ing)

Examples:

- This time tomorrow, I'll be flying to New York.
- Will you be using the car later?

Use:

• Action that will be in progress at a specific future time.

6. Future Perfect

Structure:

Subject + will have + past participle

Examples:

- By next week, she will have finished the project.
- They will not have arrived by noon.

Use:

• Action that will be completed before a certain point in the future.

7. Future Perfect Continuous

Structure:

Subject + will have been + verb(-ing)

Examples:

- By 5 p.m., I will have been studying for six hours.
- They'll have been working together for ten years by 2025.

Use:

• Focuses on the **duration** of an activity **up to a future time**.

Time Expressions

- Will: tomorrow, next week, later, soon, in a minute
- Going to: tomorrow, later, soon
- **Present Continuous**: tonight, tomorrow, on Monday
- **Simple Present**: at 9:00, next Friday (schedules)
- **Perfect Tenses**: by 2025, before noon, for 2 hours, since morning
