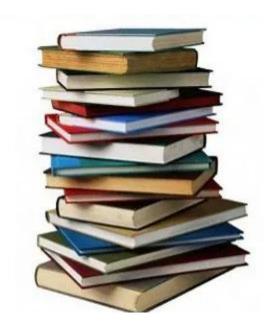


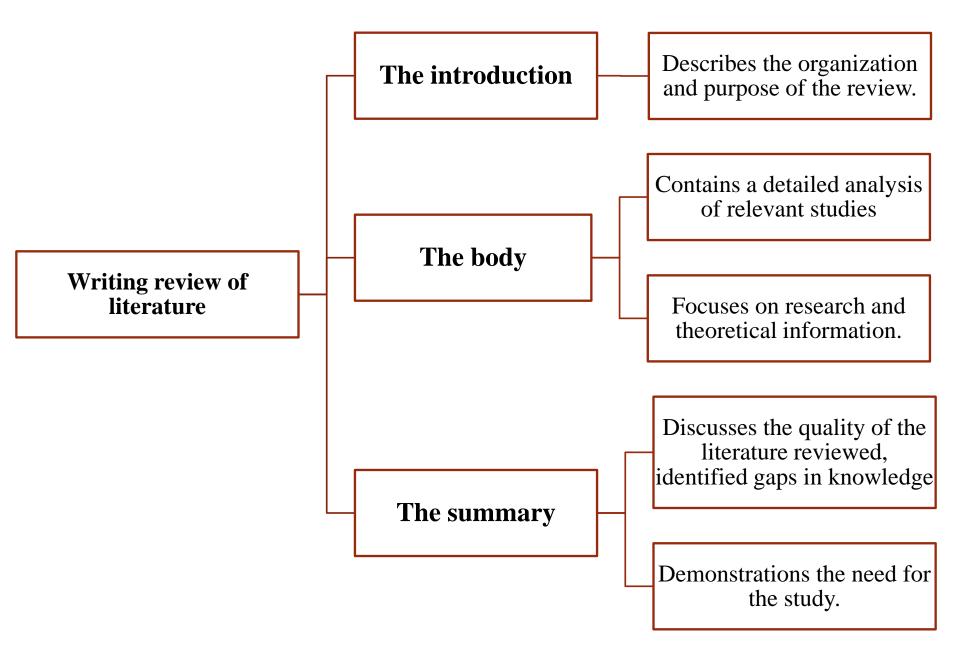

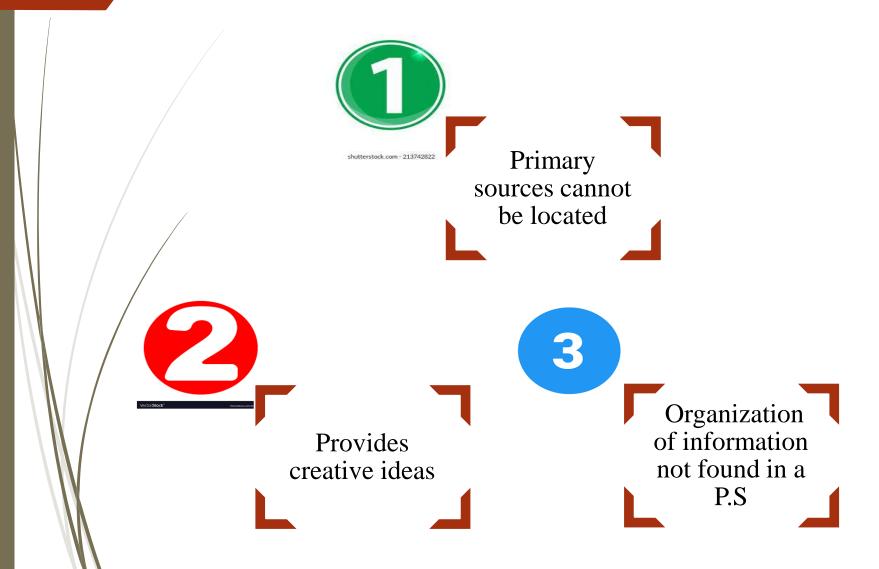
# **Primary sources**

## Nurses' knowledge about palliative care in Southeast Iran

#### ABSTRACT

Objective: Palliative care requires nurses to be knowledgeable about different aspects of the care that they provide for dying patients. This study, therefore, was conducted to examine oncology and intensive care nurses' knowledge about palliative care in Southeast Iran.

Method: Using the Palliative Care Quiz for Nursing (PCQN), 140 oncology and intensive care unit (ICU) nurses' knowledge about palliative care in three hospitals supervised by Kerman University of Medical Sciences was assessed.

Results: In PCQN, the mean score was 7.59 (SD: 2.28). The most correct answers were in the category of management of pain and other symptoms (46.07%). The lowest correct answers were in the category of psychosocial and spiritual care (19.3%).

Significance of results: These findings suggest that nurses' knowledge about palliative care can be improved by establishing specific palliative care units to focus on end-of-life care. This establishment requires incorporation of an end-of-life nursing education curriculum into undergraduate nursing studies.

#### INTRODUCTION

Death is an inevitable reality that all people share. Death is a truth that cannot be avoided by humans. This truth causes anxiety that is recognizable. when a person and that person's family members receive a diagnosis of an incurable disease. During the past decades, the numbers of people who live with life-threatening disease have risen. They need to have their remaining lifetime be as meaningful as possible, even when they are at the end stage and may have no more than months to live. This need required the palliative care movement from the 1960s (Walter, 1996). Palliative care is "an approach that improves the quality of life of patients and their families facing the problems associated with life-threatening illness, through the prevention and relief of suffering by means of early identification and impeccable assessment and treatment of pain and other problems, physical, psychosocial and spiritual." (WHO, 2003) This kind of care is provided by an interdisciplinary team including nurses, physicians, pharmacists, physiotherapists, and others (Smith, 2006). Nurses spend a lot of time caring for dying patients (Puntillo & McAdam, 2006) and actively take part in the decision-making process related to those patients (Latour et al., 2009). Usually nurses do not feel confident, adequate, and competent in the care of dying patients (Meraviglia et al., 2003). According to Goldberg et al. (1987) nurses' low level of knowledge about end-of-life care can be responsible for these feelings. Fox (2007) and Nakazawa et al. (2009) claim that nurses do not receive appropriate training about end-of-life care. Furthermore, Ferrell et al. (1999a; 1999b; 2000) assessed nursing textbooks and asserted that only 2% of nursing texts are assigned to palliative care. Kirchhoff et al. (2003) assessed 14 critical care nursing textbooks and found that none of these books were allocated to the entire content area of palliative care. In addition, three of

#### Nurses' Knowledge About Palliative Care

#### A Cross-Sectional Survey

Insufficient knowledge of palliative care among nurses is well documented and is considered one of the main obstacles to providing high-quality palliative care services. Thus, this study aims to evaluate Jordanian registered nurses' knowledge about palliative care. A quantitative research method and a descriptive cross-sectional survey design were used. The sample consisted of 190 registered nurses working in 5 Jordanian government hospitals. Most participants were male (54%) and younger than 30 years (59%). They were working in surgical (32%), medical (28%), and critical care (22%) units. The total mean score of palliative knowledge was low at 8.3 (SD, 2.8), ranging from 0 to 15. The findings of the study demonstrate that nurses have insufficient knowledge about the essence, philosophy, and principles of palliative care. This study shows that nurses have insufficient knowledge and misconceptions about palliative care. Hence, basic education is needed for all nurses working in government hospitals. This education needs to be comprehensive to cover the basic principles of palliative care and symptom management. In addition, it should address the misconceptions identified in this study.

alliative care services have been introduced and integrated in health care systems over recent years. Palliative care aims to manage patients' symptoms, reduce their burden of pain, and improve their quality of life. Life-prolonging therapies have shifted once fatal diseases into chronic diseases, prolonging lives leading to specialized palliative care to becoming an important part of health care systems and teamwork. Nurses are a crucial component of palliative care teams. Overall, the need for palliative care has increased significantly. Although it was introduced some decades ago, in Jordan provision is still scattered and

underdeveloped.<sup>5</sup> To set the study in context, information about Iordan, culture, and nursing profession is presented.

#### **General Information**

Jordan is a small country (with an area of about 35 475 square miles) located in the center of the Middle East. It is surrounded by Syria to the north, Iraq to the east, Saudi Arabia to the southeast, and Palestine to the west. According to the Jordan National Census in 2011, Jordan's total population is approximately 6.3 million. Jordan is divided into 12 cities, of which Amman is the largest, with 2 million inhabitants.6 The Iordanian population comprises 51.5% males and 94% Muslims. In addition, 6% are Christians, including various denominations such as Greek Orthodox, Roman Catholic, Greek Catholic, Armenian Orthodox, Assyrian, Maronite, and assorted Protestant churches among others.<sup>6,7</sup> According to a US report (2006), about 33% of the Jordanian population is younger than 15 years, 62% is between 15 and 64 years, and only about 4% are older than 65 years.7 Average life expectancy for Jordanians is 78 years.8 Arabic is the official language, but English is widely understood and used in highereducation institutions, hospitals, and large companies.

#### Jordanian Culture

The culture of Jordan is the Arabic Islamic culture, which comprises people's beliefs, rituals, and values. However, Western culture is apparent in the daily life of Jordanian people, expressed in dress, architecture, and even spoken language.

Women usually dress modestly and even conservatively in rural areas, and revealing a women's body is not appreciated. Most women wear headscarves, and some women veil their head and face. The separation between men and women is maintained everywhere in public, although there are no official regulations in this regard. The traditions, culture, and Islamic beliefs govern the way people deal with each other. Men and women cannot date, socialize, or have sexual intercourse before marriage.

Women can work and earn the same amount of money for the same work as men and sometimes get extra payment. Despite difficulties such as the need to obey the husband and to adhere to traditional mores, women practice many professions, including taxi drivers, teachers, nurses, and even ministers. Same-sex friends can hug, hold hands, and kiss each other in public; restrictions apply only to the

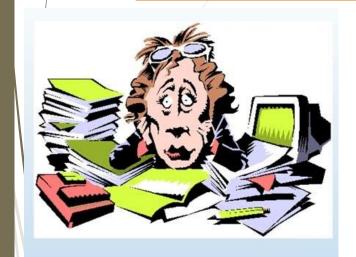

#### Abstract

The stereotypes on librarians in Romania generally imply the following features: women, glass-wearers, suspicious, mostly grumpy, etc. These labels are still strong because many libraries, particularly school libraries, are not digitised and, therefore, supply traditional services. To this, we should add the reservations about the library space which most potential users avoid because of its communist image: a boring, cold, dusty space with old books. Positive attributes are equally used, in contradiction with negative ones: librarians are communicative, kind, good readers, supportive in finding information – all of which show that the interactions between librarians, the public and the way information is conveyed in documentary services have diversified thanks to the development of new communication and information technologies thus allowing the re-invention of library identity through information culture, management policies, spaces, access to collections and services. To analyse the measure in which traditional stereotypes about libraries still act or have changed in the mind of the Romanian public and librarians on library trade, we used as research methods the group-focus, the interview, thus attempting to extract from the data we collected representational models by overlapping common points in the respondents views. We also found stereotypes on blogs, in anecdotes, and fiction.

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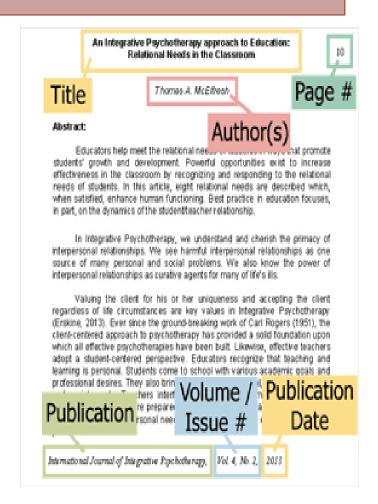

#### Abstract

#### Background

Palliative care is nowadays essential in nursing care, due to the increasing number of patients who require attention in the final stages of their life. Lack of knowledge of and negative attitude palliative care among nurses is one of the most common barriers to quality palliative care. This study, therefore, aimed to assess nurses' knowledge about palliative care and attitude toward end-of-life care in public hospitals in Wollega zones, Ethiopia.

#### Methods

A multicenter institutional-based cross-sectional study design was employed to collect data from 372 nurses working in public hospitals in Wollega zones from October 02–22, 2019. A self-administered questionnaire with three different parts: Demographic characteristics of nurses, the Palliative Care Quiz for Nursing (PCQN), and the Frommelt Attitudes Towards Care of the Dying (FATCOD). SPSS version 21 was used for analysis used for data analysis. The binary logistic regression test was used for analysis at p < 0.05.

#### Findings

Our final sample size was 422 nurses (response rate = 88%). With the mean total PCQN scores (9.34), the majority of them showed an inadequate level of knowledge about palliative care. The mean total FATCOD scores (79.58) displayed a positive attitude toward endof-life care, with 52% of respondents eager to care for a dying person and their family. Nurses who had PC service experience [AOR = 1.94 Cl (1.10–3.42), p = 0.02] and had ever attended training/lecture on PC [AOR = 1.87 Cl (1.01–3.46), p = 0.04] were independently associated with nurses' knowledge about PC. Similarly, nurses who had no PC service experience [AOR = 0.41, Cl (0.21–0.79), p = 0.008], who read articles/brochures about PC

## General purpose

Is to answer questions relevance to the nursing profession

#### Identification:

Naming an unknown phenomenon in relation to nursing, in quantitative research, identification typically precedes the inquiry.

#### **Description**:

Description of phenomena is focused on the prevalence, incidence, size, and measurable attributes of phenomena.

#### **Explanation**:

Explanatory research are to understand the foundations of specific natural phenomena, and to explain systematic relationships among phenomena.

#### **Exploration**:

- 1. Like descriptive research
- 2. Begins with a phenomenon of interest
- 3. Investigates the full nature of the phenomenon

#### Prediction:

Estimating the effects of a given situation or prevailing condition.

#### Control:

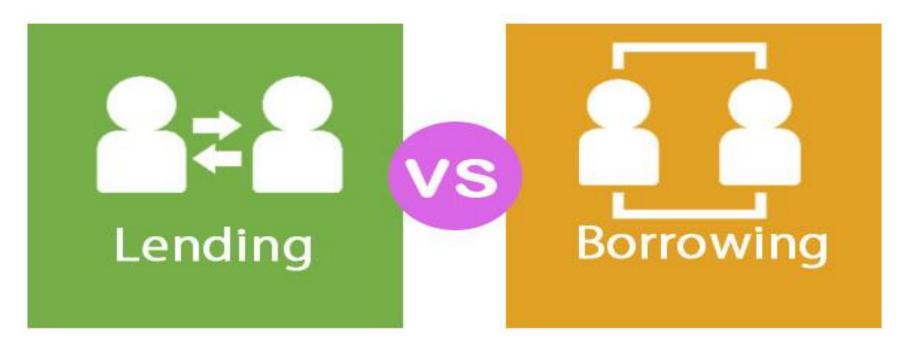
Traditions include "truths" or beliefs based on customs and trends. Nursing traditions from the past have been transferred to the present by role modeling and communication, both written and oral.

Trial and error, an approach with unknown outcomes, is used in situations of uncertainty in which other sources of knowledge are unavailable.

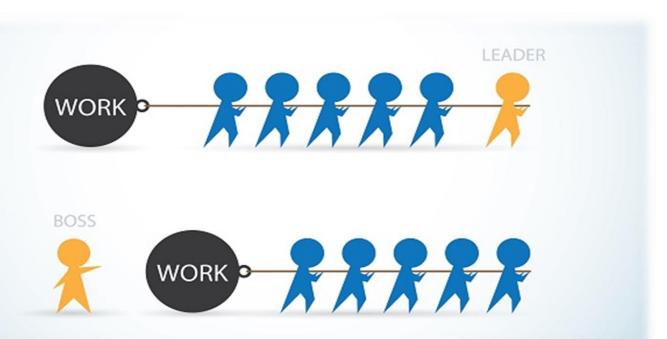
## Personal Experience

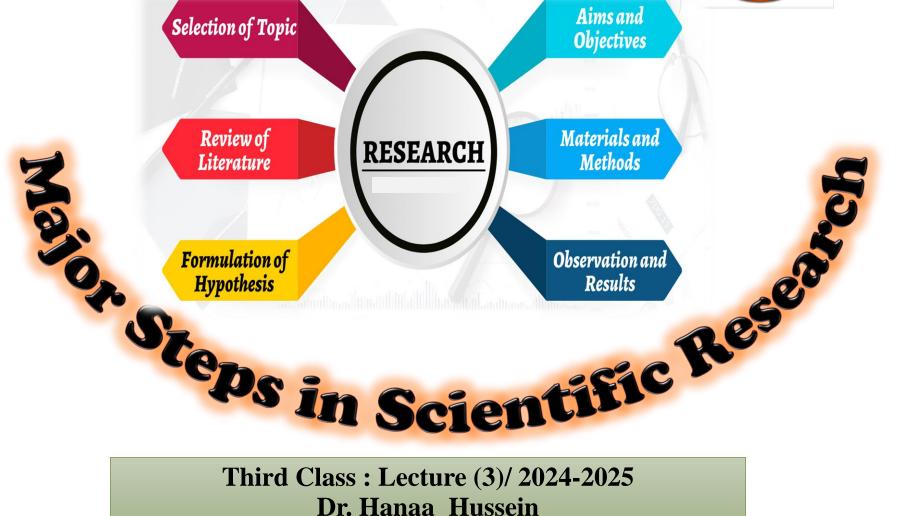

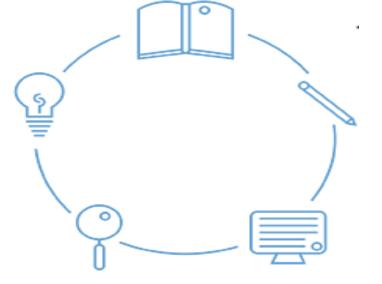

#### **Classification of Research**

#### **Basic research**

Applied research

Is often referred to as pure or fundamental research

Is conducted to gain knowledge that can be used in a practical setting.

Used to obtain empirical data that can be used to develop, refine, or test a theory without immediate concern for direct application to clinical practice.

This type of research is usually performed in actual practice conditions, on subjects who represent the group to which the results will be applied.

Closely resembles the work done in laboratories and is associated with scientists.

Research findings contribute to some modification of present practices.

# Identify The Problem

#### **Identifying the problem**

It is a clear finding of the problem that should be studied. In general, broad topic area is selected and then the topic is narrowed down to a specific one. It may be from personal experiences or literature sources.



#### **Review of Literature**

It is one of the most important steps in the research process. A literature review is an account of what has been already established or published on a particular research topic by various researchers.

#### It is the valuable part of scientific research.

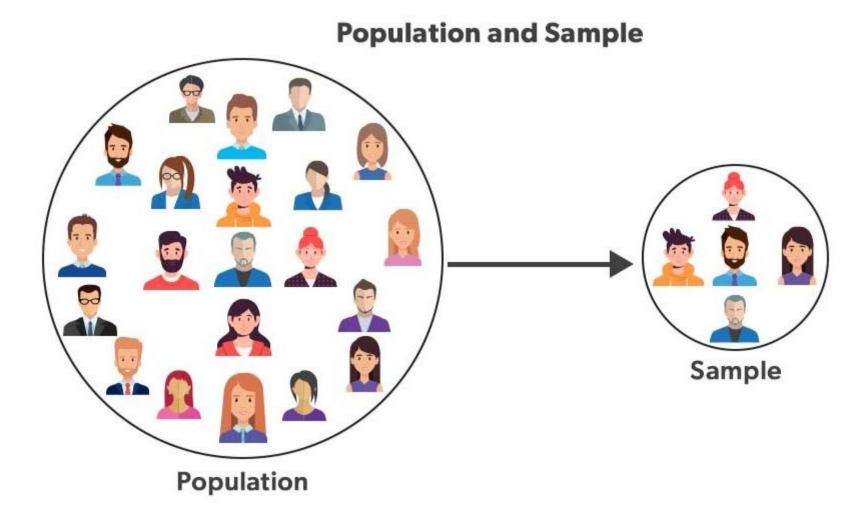

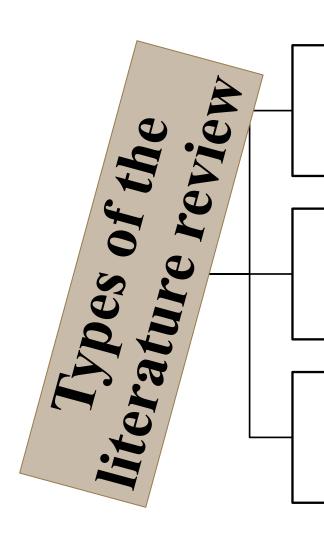


#### **Review of literature**

#### The "Literature"

Is all the written sources relevant to the study topic. The researcher conducts the review by examining all available <u>scientific</u> and <u>theoretical</u> information related to the research problem.





Describing the current knowledge of a practice problem

Identifying the gaps in this knowledge base

Explain how the study contributed to building knowledge in this area.

#### The main purpose of the review

The main purpose that helps the researcher to gauge what is known and unknown about the research problem

## 1. Identifying or refining the research problem

The researcher may not have a clearly defined research problem in mind before conducting the literature review.



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## 2. Strengthening the rational for the research

A lack of literature related to the problem may indicate that the problem need more study. The researcher may learn that the available literature contains information gaps, suggesting the need for a new study.

## 3. Developing a conceptual framework for the study

The review may lead the researcher to:

- 1. Formulate idea about how the research problem and concepts are linked.
- 2. Discover a nursing theory or a theory from related discipline that can serve as an approach to the study.

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# 4. Providing a useful approach to conducting the research

The literature review may reveal specific research strategies and procedure used in previous studies.

The researcher may be able to:

- 1. Adapt an approach used in previous study
- 2. Develop a new approach to conducting the research.

# Type of information to review



### Theoretical information

Theoretical information concerning the broader issue related to the problem: such as information includes theories from nursing and others disciplines.

### Methodological information

Methodological information on research methods used in previous studies including

- Measurement techniques
- Data analysis procedure
- Control methods.

### **Opinion articles**

Opinion articles discussing specific viewpoint or attitudes about the problem, the researcher should keep in mind such articles are subjective and therefore of limited use in a scientific review.

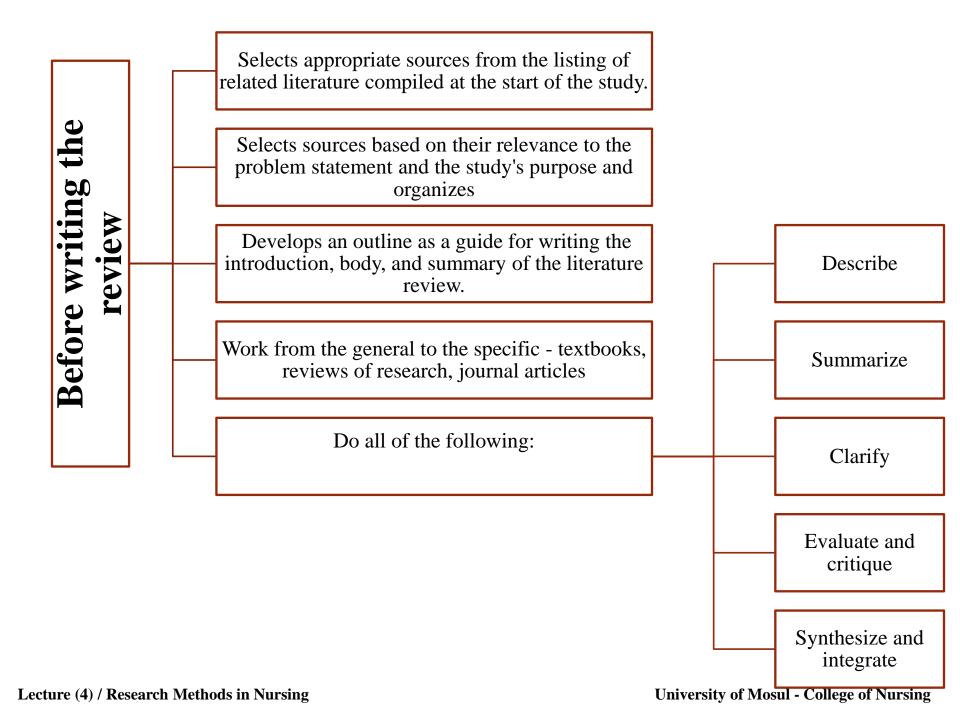

### 1. Preparing to review the literature



1. Clarify the purpose of the literature review.

2. Select electronic databases and search terms.

# 2. Conducting the search

Search the selected databases. Use a table to document the results of search. Refine search. **Review the abstracts to identify** relevant studies. **Obtain full-text copies of** relevant articles. **Ensure that information to cite** the source is recorded.

#### Abstract

#### Background

Palliative care is nowadays essential in nursing care, due to the increasing number of patients who require attention in the final stages of their life. Lack of knowledge of and negative attitude palliative care among nurses is one of the most common barriers to quality palliative care. This study, therefore, aimed to assess nurses' knowledge about palliative care and attitude toward end-of-life care in public hospitals in Wollega zones, Ethiopia.

#### Methods

A multicenter institutional-based cross-sectional study design was employed to collect data from 372 nurses working in public hospitals in Wollega zones from October 02–22, 2019. A self-administered questionnaire with three different parts: Demographic characteristics of nurses, the Palliative Care Quiz for Nursing (PCQN), and the Frommelt Attitudes Towards Care of the Dying (FATCOD). SPSS version 21 was used for analysis used for data analysis. The binary logistic regression test was used for analysis at p < 0.05.

#### Findings

Our final sample size was 422 nurses (response rate = 88%). With the mean total PCQN scores (9.34), the majority of them showed an inadequate level of knowledge about palliative care. The mean total FATCOD scores (79.58) displayed a positive attitude toward endof-life care, with 52% of respondents eager to care for a dying person and their family. Nurses who had PC service experience [AOR = 1.94 CI (1.10–3.42), p = 0.02] and had ever attended training/lecture on PC [AOR = 1.87 CI (1.01–3.46), p = 0.04] were independently associated with nurses' knowledge about PC. Similarly, nurses who had no PC service experience [AOR = 0.41, CI (0.21–0.79), p = 0.008], who read articles/brochures about PC

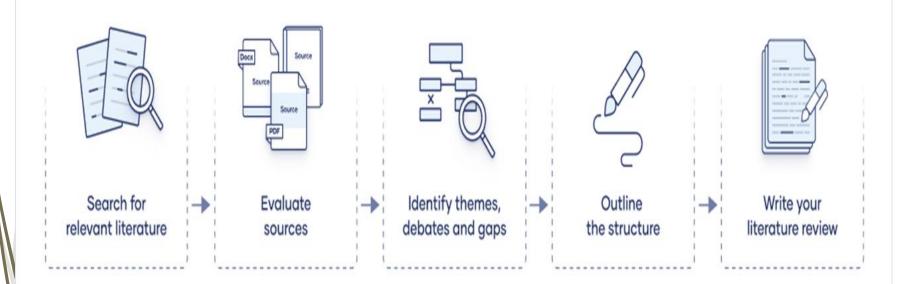
